Germany	<p><u>Latest announcement:</u> Reopening of borders on 15 June for EU and EFTA countries and the United Kingdom. As there has not been generalised lockdown, the implementation differs from one Land to another.</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> - Since April 20, reopening of stores with an area of less than 800m²; - Since May 4, reopening of hairdressers; - Since May 11, reopening of all shops and schools; - The football championship resumed behind closed doors on 16 May; - As far as restaurants, museums, cinemas and theatres are concerned, the Länder are autonomous in deciding on their reopening; - Large gatherings will be allowed from the end of August. <p>Border controls for european countries were lifted on 15 June.</p>
Austria	<p><u>Latest announcement:</u> On 15 June, borders will reopen for 31 countries, including members of the Union except Portugal, Spain, Sweden and Great Britain.</p> <p>Since April 14, reopening of small shops up to 400 m² as well as DIY and gardening shops.</p> <p>De-confinement began on May 1 with the reopening of all stores, shopping centres and hairdressers.</p> <p>Since May 4, schools have been gradually reopening;</p> <p>Since May 15, reopening of restaurants, churches and religious communities. Gatherings of 10 people are allowed;</p> <p>From May 29, reopening of hotels.</p> <p>Large public gatherings will be allowed from mid-July.</p> <p>A 14-day period of home quarantine is compulsory for anyone entering Austria, unless they present a molecular biology test that is less than 4 days old.</p>
Belgium	<p><u>Latest announcement:</u> Reopening of borders for Schengen member countries on 15 June.</p> <p>Since May 4, reopening of the DIY and gardening stores</p> <p>Since May 11:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> - Permission to host 4 people at home (always the same ones); - Opening of shops (small shops, respect of sanitary instructions)

	<p>Since May 18:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> - Resumption of primary and secondary school; - Resumption of contact professions (hairdressers, beauticians); - Opening of museums; - Resumption of outdoor sports or lessons (maximum 20 people in the presence of a coach); - Wedding ceremonies can take place (maximum 30 people, no reception afterwards); - Gatherings remain prohibited until August 31. <p>A 14-day period of home quarantine is obligatory for anyone entering Belgian territory..</p>
Bulgaria	<p><u>Latest announcement:</u> Containment measures were lifted on 15 June, the wearing of masks remains compulsory in public transport, pharmacies and medical establishments.</p> <p>Timeline:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> - Since 4 May, individual outdoor sports activities are allowed and swimming pools are open. - Since 6 May, the checkpoints set up to manage inter-city travel have been abolished. - Since 18 May, visits to museums, galleries and libraries have been resumed provided that social distancing measures are respected. Shopping centres have reopened. - Since 22 May, closed-door team sports activities have been permitted. - Since 1 June, travel restrictions with Greece and Serbia will be eased. Tourists will be able to enter the country from 15 June. - As of 1 June : <ul style="list-style-type: none"> - Reopening of restaurants and cafes; - Resumption of extra-curricular activities for children. - On 5 June, resumption of professional football matches (1st and 2nd league, stadiums can be filled to 30% of their capacity). <p>Some travellers have to observe a 14-day quarantine if they come from : Sweden, United Kingdom, Belgium, Ireland, Portugal, Spain, Malta, Italy, non-EU countries.</p>
Cyprus	<p><u>Latest announcement:</u> International flights resume on June 9</p> <p>Timeline:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> - Beginning May 4th: Reopening of construction sites, shops and markets; - Since May 18th, reopening of the outdoor training areas for professional sportsmen and women; - Since 21 May: Lifting of all travel restrictions, reopening of hairdressing salons, businesses can resume their activity. - Since 23 May: Reopening of beaches and casinos.

	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> - Since June 1st : - Ports can carry on all their activities; - Reopening of libraries, museums and historical sites; - Authorization for religious ceremonies; - Certain nationals may enter Cyprus if they come from: Austria, Bulgaria, Croatia, Czech Republic, Baltic States, Denmark, Finland, Greece, Hungary, Luxembourg, Malta, Norway, Slovakia, Slovenia, Switzerland. <p>A negative test of less than 72 hours is necessary.</p>
Croatia	<p><u>Last Announcement:</u> Since June 3, visits to hospitals are allowed.</p> <p>Beginning May 10:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> - Gatherings of up to 40 people allowed; - Shopping malls, restaurants, parks open; <p>Since May 18, easing of restrictions on organizing cultural events.</p> <p>The territory is accessible for professional and tourists. There is no longer any quarantine but the authorities reserve the right to place travellers in self-isolation.</p>
Denmark	<p><u>Latest announcement:</u> From 15 June, partial reopening of borders for tourists coming from Norway, Germany and Iceland.</p> <p>Beginning April 15 with the reopening of the nurseries and high school classes.</p> <p>Employees were able to return to their workplace provided they respected the rules of distancing.</p> <p>The authorities have also increased screening capacity and have set up a digital tracking system.</p> <p>Since May 11, total reopening of shops, several cultural activities, including libraries.</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> - Professional and outdoor sports are allowed, as well as zoo visits by car. <p>Since May 18, reopening of restaurants and cafés, resumption of classes for secondary school classes, lessons and exams requiring physical presence;</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> - Professional sports are allowed behind closed doors. <p>Only Danes and persons with a residence permit or special permission, or with a "legitimate reason", may enter the country.</p>
Spain	<p><u>Latest announcement:</u> The alarm status has been extended to June 21. The borders (except with Portugal) will also reopen on 21 June.</p> <p>Beginning May 4 for some territories, with the reopening of small shops and restaurants (limited to 30% of normal capacity).</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> - Gradual and asymmetrical resumption (in 3 phases) according to local conditions and under the condition of strict respect of the distancing measures;

	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> - Individual sports are allowed; - Wearing a mask is mandatory on public transport; <p>For Phase 1 regions, gatherings of up to 10 people are permitted. Phase 2 should lead to the reopening of cinemas and theatres (limiting their capacity to 30%) and shopping centres. Beaches, night bars and nightclubs will reopen during phase 3. A 14-day period of quarantine at home is compulsory for anyone entering Spain.</p>
Estonia	<p><u>Latest announcement:</u> June 12, resumption of children's and student camps. Beginning May 5 with the opening of shops and the authorization of indoor and outdoor sports activities. Since May 10, permission for the public celebrations of religious services; Since May 11, reopening of the museums; Since May 15, reopening of schools; Since May 18, sports activities with a maximum of 100 spectators are allowed, as well as public gatherings. Cinemas, concert and conference halls may open. From June 1, reopening of swimming pools, authorization of visits to health centres. The borders are open to symptom-free travellers from EU member states, Schengen, and the United Kingdom since June 1st.</p>
Finland	<p><u>Latest announcement:</u> On 15 June, the end of internal border controls for the land borders with Norway. Self-isolation is recommended for all persons arriving from outside (except from Estonia, Latvia, Lithuania, Norway, Denmark and Iceland). Beginning on May 14 with the opening of borders for Schengen countries for "essential travel".</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> - Outdoor recreation facilities were able to open, libraries can open for the borrowing of books. - Students can resume classes (but online courses are still recommended); - Obligation to wear a mask at work; <p>As of June 1, reopening of cultural spaces (opera, theatre, sports centres, national archives, conference rooms) and resumption of sports competitions with special arrangements;</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> - Public gatherings of up to 50 people will be allowed; <p>As of June 30, visits to medical or nursing homes will be permitted; From the end of July, public events with over 500 people will be permitted. Control at the country's borders is in place until June 14. A 14-day period of home quarantine is compulsory for anyone entering Finland.</p>
France	<p><u>Latest announcement:</u> Reopening of borders from 15 June to Schengen member countries. The state of health emergency will be lifted on 10 July. Bars and restaurants in Île-de-France reopened on 15 June. The return to crèches, nursery,</p>

	<p>primary and secondary schools will be compulsory from 22 June. The second round of municipal elections will take place on 28 June.</p> <p>Beginning May 11:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> - Permission to travel within 100 km of one's home; - Opening of markets and shops, except for shopping centres of more than 40,000 m2. - Reopening of parks in the "green" departments; - Prohibition of any gathering of more than 10 people; - Obligation to wear a mask on public transport; - Reopening of libraries and small museums; - A certificate of travel exemption is still required for the use of public transport during the rush hours in the "red" departments. <p>Since May 19, reopening of religious places .</p> <p>Stage 2 is scheduled for June 2.</p> <p>Borders reopened starting 15 June to Schengen member states.</p>
Greece	<p><u>Latest announcement</u>: On 15 June, reopening of the remaining hotels and the first step towards freeing travel to Greece for tourists coming from abroad, reopening of vocational rehabilitation and support services for the disabled, museums and historical areas, fitness facilities, leisure and theme parks, physical wellness centre, sauna and spa, baths and thermal springs; resumption of flights abroad to the airport "Macedonia".</p> <p>Beginning on May 4 with the reopening of the hairdressers and shops.</p> <p>Churches were able to reopen for individual worship;</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> - Wearing masks and distancing are mandatory on public transport; <p>Since May 5, the first EODY mobile screening units have been in place;</p> <p>Since May 11, reopening of high schools for students in their final year of high school;</p> <p>Since May 16, reopening of 515 beaches;</p> <p>Since May 17, churches can resume public celebration of the sacraments;</p> <p>Since May 18, authorization of interregional travel, reopening of zoos and botanical gardens, archaeological sites, rehearsals and filming;</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> - reopening of the other classes in high schools; <p>As of June 1, reopening of shopping malls, cafes and restaurants with terraces;</p> <p>Late June/early July: reopening of hotels.</p> <p>Tests of Covid-19 are systematically carried out at Athens Airport.</p>

Hungary	<p><u>Latest announcement:</u> On June 15, hospital visits are again permitted.</p> <p>Beginning May 4 with the overall lifting of traffic restrictions in the countryside.</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> - The elderly still benefit from a reserved exit slot from 9am to 12pm; - Wearing a mask is compulsory in public places; - Opening of the terraces of cafés, restaurants and hotels; - Resumption of sports events behind closed doors. <p>The borders remain closed to foreigners.</p>
Ireland	<p><u>Latest announcement:</u> The third phase of deconfinement is scheduled for 29 June.</p> <p>Started on May 18 in 5 phases:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> - Wearing a mask is mandatory, traffic is limited to a radius of 5 km; - Authorization of outdoor gatherings up to 4 people; - Reopening of convenience stores. <p>Phase 2 will begin on June 8 with the authorisation of traffic within a radius of 20 km, and a specific timetable reserved for vulnerable groups;</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> - Maintaining distance working where possible; - Reopening of small shops and markets; - Opening of public libraries, - Resumption of sports training in small groups. <p>Phase 3 will begin on June 29</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> - Opening of other non-essential businesses to be limited to retail outlets with entry and exit at street level ; - Reopening of playgrounds, indoor sports activities, outdoor cafés and restaurants. <p>Phase 4 will begin on July 20 with permission to travel outside one' s own region;</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> - - Relaxation of restrictions on group home visits; - - Authorization of small gatherings (baptisms, weddings); - - Opening of crèches and pre-schools; - - Return to work when distance working is not possible. - - Relaxation of restrictions for high-risk services requiring physical contact (hairdressers); - - Re-opening of museums, galleries and places of worship; - - Resumption of sports competitions and reopening of swimming pools; - - Re-opening of hotels on limited occupancy bases; <p>Phase 5 will begin on August 10 with the authorization of large gatherings while maintaining distancing measures and barrier gestures.</p>

Italy	<p><u>Latest announcement:</u> As of June 15, theatres and cinemas will reopen. Beginning April 27 with the reopening of the DIY stores. Since May 4, opening of the parks, permission for take-away sales and family travel in the same region, subject to compliance with the distancing measures; Since May 18, resumption of religious services, opening of museums, libraries, bars and restaurants (terraces). - Large gatherings remain prohibited and travel between regions must be justified. - Masks are compulsory in places open to the public. From May 25, reopening of gymnasiums, swimming pools and sports centres. Travellers from European Economic Area countries can travel freely in Italy. Theatres and cinemas will reopen on 15 June.</p>
Latvia	<p><u>Latest announcement:</u> Since June 10th, indoor events welcoming up to 100 people and outdoor events welcoming 300 people are allowed. Catering services must maintain a distance of two metres between tables. Cultural events can accommodate 50% of the expected audience. Distance learning courses are maintained until July 31. Beginning May 12: - Sports training are possible under certain conditions. Competitions are not allowed. - Cultural places (museums, bookshops) reopened in accordance with health instructions; - Gatherings of up to 25 people are allowed (ensuring a distance of 2 m). - Indoor events cannot exceed 3 hours; Since May 15, the internal borders between the three Baltic countries have been open; The state of emergency has been extended until June 9. A 14-day home quarantine is obligatory for anyone entering Latvia (except Baltic citizens or permanent residents).</p>
Lithuania	<p><u>Latest announcement:</u> The quarantine will be lifted on 16 June, internal border controls have been extended (for non-Baltic nationals) until 16 July. The border with Poland was reopened on 12 June. Beginning May 4: - Mandatory wearing of masks in public places; - Opening of shops and markets; Since May 15, opening of the internal borders between the three Baltic countries. Religious celebrations are permitted. Travellers from 24 countries will no longer need to observe quarantine upon arrival in Lithuania: Austria, Bulgaria, Croatia, Cyprus, Czech Republic, Denmark, Estonia, Finland, France, Germany, Greece, Hungary, Italy, Latvia, Liechtenstein, Luxembourg, Netherlands, Norway, Poland, Romania, Slovakia, Slovenia, Switzerland.</p>

Luxembourg	<p><u>Latest Announcement:</u> On May 29th, restaurants reopened, public events, sports activities can take place - except competition - and catering services resumed.</p> <p>Beginning April 20:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> - Resumption of activities for construction sites, nurseries and DIY stores; - Wearing a mask is mandatory in public places. <p>Since May 4, home visits are allowed (6 people maximum);</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> - Open-air public gatherings of 20 people maximum; - The opening of shops (except bars and restaurants) and museums, libraries and archives under respect of distancing measures. - The start of the school year for the first and final year students. <p>Since May 11, the other students have resumed classes.</p>
Malta	<p><u>Latest announcement:</u> Airport reopens on July 1st and all sports resume on July 15th.</p> <p>Beginning May 4:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> - Mandatory wearing of masks in public places; - Authorization of gatherings of maximum 4 people; - Reopening of certain types of businesses, lottery offices, and vehicle registration stations; - Resumption of vaccination services for children and cancer screening. <p>A 14-day period of home quarantine is mandatory for anyone entering the territory.</p>
The Netherlands	<p><u>Latest announcement:</u> Reopening of borders for EU Member States on 15 June, except for Denmark and Sweden (+ the United Kingdom).</p> <p>Beginning April 29 with the reopening of small shops and the permission of sports activities for young people under 18 years old.</p> <p>Since May 11, reopening of primary schools, nurseries, libraries, hairdressing salons ;</p> <p>As of June 2, opening of secondary schools</p> <p>Gatherings of more than 5,000 people are banned until September.</p>
Poland	<p><u>Latest announcement:</u> The borders reopened on 13 June. On 15 June, shopping centres, kindergartens, private schools, gymnasiums and outdoor swimming pools reopened. Events with more than 50 people are allowed.</p> <p>Beginning April 20 with the opening of the forests and parks.</p> <p>Since May 4, reopening of some sports facilities as well as shopping centres, hotels, museums and libraries ;</p> <p>Since May 6, day nurseries and kindergartens have been able to reopen;</p> <p>Since May 11, reopening of hairdressing, beauty and cosmetic salons;</p> <p>From May 24, reopening of schools and universities;</p>

	<p>As of May 29, football matches can resume. The borders remain closed; a 14-day home quarantine is compulsory for anyone entering the country.</p>
Portugal	<p><u>Latest announcement</u>: End of the third phase of deconfinement and reopening of borders to Schengen countries. Beginning May 4 in 3 phases: Phase 1 from 4 to 17 May: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> - Opening of shops of under 200 m2, hairdressers, barbers and beauty salons ; - Opening of bookshops, libraries and archives; - Universities can resume classes; - Public transport is limited to two thirds of its capacity. Phase 2 from 18 to 31 May: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> - Opening of shops of under 400 m2, day nurseries, partially and on a voluntary basis, - Restaurants and cafés can open (capacity limited to 50%; opening hours between 10am and 11pm); - Opening of museums, art galleries and national monuments; - Religious ceremonies will be allowed on 30 May. Phase 3 from 1 to 14 June. <ul style="list-style-type: none"> - Resumption of kindergarten classes; - Opening of all shops and shopping malls, theatres and cinemas with limited capacity; - The football championship may resume on June 4, behind closed doors. - The beaches will be reopened on June 6, with specific regulations. The border with Spain remains closed.</p>
Czech Republic	<p><u>Latest announcement</u>: Restaurants and hotels will reopen on May 25th. Begins April 24 with gatherings of up to 10 people allowed. Since April 27, reopening of shops up to 2500 m2, as well as driving schools and gymnasiums. Since May 11, reopening of hairdressing salons, museums, theatres, cinemas and cultural activities. Partial reopening of primary, secondary and art schools. As of May 25, reopening of restaurants and hotels. A Covid-19 (negative) test is required to travel to the country.</p>
Romania	<p><u>Latest Announcement</u>: Reopening of all restaurants on June 15. Beginning May 15 with the lifting of restrictions on the movement of persons. Since May 15 and for a renewable period of 30 days, the country has been in high alert mode. <ul style="list-style-type: none"> - The wearing of masks is still compulsory in public areas and public events are still prohibited; - Reopening of hotels, hairdressing salons and museums. Restaurants remain closed, as well as bars, cafés, cinemas </p>

	<p>and theatres, indoor swimming pools and sports halls, shopping centres of more than 15,000 m² ;</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> - Any gathering of more than 3 people is forbidden; - The schools are scheduled to reopen in September. <p>Non-European citizens are prohibited from entering the country. A 14-day period of home quarantine is obligatory for all persons entering the territory.</p>
Slovakia	<p><u>Latest announcement:</u> On June 10, possibility of gatherings of 500 people outside, opening of elementary art schools, reopening of nightclubs and reopening of borders to 19 countries.</p> <p>Beginning April 21:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> - But by March 30, some businesses and services had reopened; <p>Since April 21, obligation to protect one's face in the public space;</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> - Opening of markets in Bratislava; <p>Since May 6, opening of all shops and services except shopping centres, unless the store has external access (9am-11am, Monday to Friday, time slot reserved for seniors);</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> - Short term accommodation is possible; - Hairdressing and beauty salons, open-air terraces reopen; - Masses and weddings are allowed again but under strict conditions (distance of 2 m, wearing a mask, limited number of people); - The three international airports (Bratislava, Košice, Poprad) remain closed. <p>Only Slovaks and persons with a residence permit or special authorisation may enter the country. A 14-day period of home quarantine is obligatory for all persons entering the territory.</p>
Slovenia	<p><u>Latest announcement:</u> On 15 June, sporting events resume and events with up to 500 people can be held.</p> <p>Beginning April 30 with the end of restrictions on free movement. It was then possible to travel outside one's hometown.</p> <p>Since 4 May, reopening of shops.</p> <p>This was the first European country to declare to have “win the battle” against the virus.</p> <p>Foreign nationals with permanent or temporary residence may enter the country.</p> <p>A quarantine of 7 days is mandatory.</p>
Sweden	<p><u>Latest announcement:</u> Reopening of secondary schools on June 15th.</p> <p>As the only EU Member State that has not confined its population, gatherings of more than 50 people remain prohibited.</p> <p>Travel outside the country is prohibited until June 15.</p>
